We will be involved in the running of community events in each of the regional centres in addition to a golf tournament at Wairakei in Taupo and a dinner in Auckland on 07 July.



## Charles Shadbolt

We were extremely saddened earlier in the year to attend the funeral of a long-time advocate for Conductive Education. Charles and the team at Independent Fisheries have done so much to support the good work that we do over many many years. Charles will be sadly missed by all of us and we extend our condolences and gratitude to the Independent Fisheries family.

## Professional Development

After seeking feedback from centres we instigated a change to our professional development support during 2016. Rather than providing a one-off opportunity for all centre staff, NZFCE funded 11 staff from our centres to attend a training programme of their choice which would enhance their knowledge and develop their skills. The feedback from this has been fantastic and NZFCE will again be funding centres and individuals to have targeted professional development during the 2017 year.

## Social Enterprise Up-date

Our social enterprise to support our affiliated members and other not-for-profits to access grant funding was launched in December and resulted in a great outcome for one of our centres. We have a couple of other organisations also wanting to access our services. This is a very cost effective way of utilising the skills of someone with expertise in grant applications to support your centre while also benefitting NZFCE. The small fee that you pay will support the development of Conductive Education in New Zealand. It's a win win!!

## A Good Start in Life

The reference group is still meeting every couple of months but are no clearer about how things will look long term with Ministry of Education and Ministry of Health contracts. What we are sure about is that there will be a change to current contracting which will take effect December 2018. What this means for Conductive Education remains to be seen, but we will continue to advocate strongly for the families that attend our services. Choice and flexibility for families is high on the Ministries' agenda and something that we are also very passionate about. I will keep you posted!

## Parent Support

NZFCE are working closely with the Cerebral Palsy Society and Parent to Parent to develop parent support training for families who have a child with Cerebral Palsy.

In the initial stages the parent training will be offered in Christchurch on 6/7 May and will cover communication skills, looking at grief issues, and provides the opportunity for personal awareness where parents can consider their ability to support others in similar circumstances. At the conclusion of the training, parents are able to become volunteer Support Parents - Support Parents provide support to families contacting Parent to Parent. We all know how difficult it can be at times as parents to grapple with having a child with a disability and this is a fantastic way of supporting others. Get in touch if you want further info.

We were all ready for a new school year and started with a workshop on the development of the children with Nathan Mikaere Wallis.

This year we are focusing more on communication, using low tech devices and lots of visuals in and around the classroom.

Some of our students had a great opportunity in March to try Sailing with Sailability Wellington.


The kids really enjoyed this activity, and Levai wrote a great story about it.

We are fortunate that we have Hutt Science Centre on site at our school. They provide us with ready to use science kits which are a great way to learn science. This term we have carried out explorations on; Flowers, Petals, Pollution and, Sweet and Sour.

Room 7 continue regular visits to Kimi Ora Special School, where we participate in music sessions.

The children are making amazing progress: Levai – in his reading and writing; Renee – receptive and expressive language and matching colours; Daemon – walking in the parallel bar, sidewalking, and language; Keeleigh with using her communication buttons; Paulini – sitting up on the floor keeping her head up; Misty – receptive language.

We would like to welcome Michelle to our Room. Michelle is a Teacher Aide working with us three afternoons. We are also fortunate to have Sarah working with the children. Sarah is our SLT who comes in weekly and provides assistance and advice for the children.



## Glowkids

We are now fully back into the swing of another year, with this comes a busy time for children, parents and staff alike. We have so many goals to achieve.

Last year we started discussions with the Ministry of Education regarding the work that GlowKids undertakes on behalf of our children. Whilst we were not funded for this work, we diligently undertook this to ensure that our children got the best possible start to their early childhood education. This year the Ministry of Education recognised the work undertaken and we were lucky enough to obtain some funding. At this stage this funding is short term, we are hoping that this will be continued after June. Our wish is that we eventually obtain Early Intervention Service Provider status. Watch this space!!

Our Early Intervention Teacher/Conductor is busy attending IEP's, and visiting other Kindergartens to ensure that the staff there are aware of how best to assist our children. She has also introduced visuals to ensure that the transition from one body position to another is maintained.

In May of this year we have been selected as one of the charities that our local Z petrol station has chosen, this is for their "GOOD IN THE HOOD" promotion. This means that Z customers can vote by using their orange tokens to place this into one of 4 charities to share in \$4,000. Not only would it be great to get the lions share, it is also a great way of highlighting our profile.

Joining our team this year we have our Art Therapist Julia Hanna. Julia comes to us with a lot of experience, as well as a passion for working with children with disabilities. We have definitely seen some great masterpieces come out of these art sessions. Another new staff member of the GlowKids team, is Andrea Edwards our Speech Language Therapist. Andi has vast experience in Speech Language Therapy, and works across our Conductive Education classes and Sensory Kindy. It is fantastic to have these people join our team, it is also extremely gratifying to have such a passionate,

committed and professional team.

During the 1st term break, GlowKids is presenting a workshop to CCS Disability Action staff inclusive of early intervention teachers and SLT staff. This year we have welcomed a steady stream of visitors to our centre, as well as having had Early Childhood Education students on placement. It is always welcoming to receive such positive feedback from visitors and students.

## Conductive Education Waikato

We have enjoyed a busy start to the year here in Hamilton. We started by welcoming two new team members, Paula Matheson, an Occupational Therapist and Natasha Griffiths, an Early Childhood Teacher. We are very lucky to have these two ladies on board.

It is a bit of a change for us to have an Occupational Therapist in Centre. Though we are well supported by the Child Development Centre with their team of therapists, following parent feedback, we saw this as a gap in service and opted to bring the knowledge of this field into our service provision. We have been very fortunate to have Paula respond to our search. Paula brings to this role her experience in paediatrics via her work at Taranaki DHB and also experience from previous work for the Ministry of Education. As this is a new role, it is evolving as we move forward.

Natasha adds more support for our Early Childhood Education provision. Previously working for our service in a casual role, Natasha joins us as part of the team. As with Health and the Disability Sector, Education has its own changes that we need to be able to implement into our programme - and it all takes time and staffing.

It is really lovely to see how well our children are progressing this term. We made a few changes at the end of 2016, with children moving through from Individual Sessions to Groups or changing up to alternate Groups in readiness for school. Great to see how these changes have already supported children's learning.

The children continue to enjoy a busy learning schedule. Our programme Group sessions continue to offer a structured, fun learning environment. Starting the years learning with Tiriti o Waitangi, Red Group visited our local Museum to view the New Zealand Exhibition including the majestic Te Winika, a 200 year-old carved waka taua (Māori war canoe). They also really enjoyed Te Whaanau Maarama: The Heavenly Bodies, an exhibition sharing understanding of Māori Astronomy.

'Floating and Sinking' topic tied in well with our erratic weather here in the Waikato but also with access to hydrotherapy.

Three groups have been offered hydrotherapy this term, our two junior groups are parent and child groups focusing on individual physical activities, whilst our older children are supported by staff and access this as an addition to their usual daily programme,



learning and practicing basic water skills.

I think the 'Bugs' topic this term was quite a success. With a well-resourced programme, children had great fun playing and learning about different bugs, providing lots of excited reactions, and incidentally, learning in so many other areas.

We had a brief look at Hot Air Balloons as the annual Balloons over Waikato passed through, with a quick visit by a big red and yellow balloon to the neighbouring School grounds causing some excitement, and we finish off this term with an Easter topic.

All of these 'topics' create themes for our children to explore language, learning about the world around them, about themselves and relationships with others and providing infinite opportunities to practice fine and gross motor skills. Well done to our talented team for their work in developing these creative learning environments.

Looking forward to more learning and celebrating learning outcomes in term 2!

their home life and has a positive affect all around.

This includes inclusion at school and the acceptance and care other children show towards our students, which we see daily in class and at playtime. Knowing the relationships they create will potentially build life-long friendships.

## Wellington Conductive Education Early Childhood Centre

We can't believe that we're only weeks away from the end of Term One! The last couple of months have just flown past for all of us here at Conductive Education Wellington. Since our last update in October we have been delighted to have welcomed so many new preschool and after-school families to our Centre, as well as saying goodbye to others on a good and lasting note.

We have also, as expected, had several existing preschool children extend their hours/days of attendance. These extensions go some way towards filling the spare capacity we had in the afternoon sessions. We are now averaging nine to ten preschool children per session.

We have a lovely mix of preschool ages and abilities, which is great but definitely keeps us on our toes! Three of these children also attend mainstream Kindergarten part-time, spending at least two days a week there, as well as coming to the centre. This is a good combination of learning environments that complement each other. We also have a couple of children that we will sadly farewell in the coming months as they transition to school.

Our afterschool programme is busy and we are currently trialling a programme, in partnership with a specialist from Explore, to deliver individual and group behavioural strategy sessions for our children with ASD. This is going well. Our swimming programme on Thursdays continues to be a favourite with the afterschool group.

Our children have been working so hard on their tasks series/routine and we are so impressed on how well they are progressing with both their gross motor and fine motor skills. It is always great seeing the enjoyment the children get from the sensory stimulation of touch, music and social interaction which helps with their communication and social skills. We have also introduced several of our younger children to RDA this year and after some initial nervousness they are now really enjoying themselves which is great for their confidence, improved balance, core strength. The children's confidence in the water also continues to grow every week and it is just amazing how the water encourages a wider range of movement and opposition and an improved sense of independence. We have several children that can now freely walk in the water with no/or very little assistance, whereas outside of the pool they are unable to walk without their walking frames.

We have made two changes to our staffing team since our last update. Yan our Registered Early Childhood Teacher has reduced her days of work this year so this led to us to employ another Registered Early Childhood Teacher, Danielle Simnor, to job share with Yan. We also now have more children with very high/complex needs that require a lot more hands on assistance from staff so we have employed a second full-time Conductor's Assistant, Tarika Naidu to accommodate this change.



## Cashmere High School Conductive Education

Kia ora Koutou, Te Pukenga – Conductive Education students are well and truly back into the swing of things as we are fast approaching the end of the first term. The school year always starts off with school athletics which our students like to support and have a go, as well as cheering on their house while dressed in house colours.

There are always several events that take place at the end of each year that we like to share with you through the newsletter. In 2016, term three some of the All Blacks who are ambassadors for Cure Kids Foundation came to school to support the Cure Kids campaign. Some of our students who are big fans made sure that they were there to get photos and to talk to them. Go the All Blacks!

Also at the end of last year we congratulated one of our staff members, Marta Katona our Conductor/Teacher who is originally from Hungary officially became a New Zealand citizen. Marta received her citizenship in a ceremony

presented by the Christchurch Mayor in September. You are officially a Kiwi now Marta!

We have to mention all the great times we had during our Outdoor Education Week in 2016. The theme was "Around the World in Four Days. So with passports packed the students participated in activities from different areas of the world, Africa, Asia, Pacific and the Antarctica. The students really enjoyed the week and it is always a big thank you to all the staff who put in extra time and effort to make this week a success.

We have a new student who has joined us this year. We welcome Rose Ford and her family to Te Pukenga – Conductive Education. Rose came to us from Redcliffs Primary School. We have twelve students in Conductive Education this year.

We are now looking forward to our Term One excursion to Trickle Creek Farm (in keeping with our Term One focus–Farm Animals) and our upcoming six monthly Conductive Education Plan (CEP) assessment day in April. It is always wonderful to meet with all the families and jointly form plans for their child's future goals.

The Conductive Education Wellington Board of Trustees

has agreed to restructure the operation of our Centre by establishing the position of a Centre Manager. The Board considers this role is needed in order to have clear responsibilities for all Centre functions, and a single point of contact for our partners (such as Ministry of Education, the Ministry of Health, and various other key community, public funding and disability partnerships). Government agencies which provide a large share of our funding also expect a clear management structure when negotiating contracts. This restructure also aligns to how other Conductive Education Centres around New Zealand are managed and is structured so the position will be consistent with best practice. Karen Garrison will be stepping down from her role as Centre Administrator, to make way for the new Centre Manager in May 2017.

Conductive Education Wellington Trust has a bright future. We are stable and financially sound, with good facilities and staff. The recruitment of a Centre Manager will be a key next step in sustaining our success.


Our outside space is set up and the children are enjoying the lovely new lawn we have to play on, along with the different perspective of a new location.
